 Pearl Harbor, HI**

**The WWII Battle of Midway,
 June 4-7, 1942**

Midway Atoll, 1,300 miles northwest of Hawaii, was vital during WWII as a refueling point and became the site of a pivotal U.S. - Japan battle. The Imperial Japanese Navy spent more than a year preparing for a strategy it believed would bait the Americans to fight and lose there, giving Japan unquestioned superiority in the Pacific. On the first day of the battle, it seemed Japan had won. But in the few days that followed, America prevailed and forever changed the course of the war in the Pacific.

The American Battle Monuments Foundation is the non-profit partner of the American Battle Monuments Commission, the U.S. agency responsible for all 26 American military cemeteries and 31 monuments overseas. Nearly 234.000 American service men and women are buried or memorialized (remains missing) at ABMC hallowed sites.
